Toast to His Majesty the King of Thailand At A Charity Dinner in Auckland Sunday 11 December 2011

Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is my great honour to be here this evening to celebrate with you the 84th Birthday of His Majesty the King; also known as the seventh cycle according to the traditional lunar calendar, which is of particular importance to the Thai people.

As a Thai, and particularly as His Majesty's Ambassador, allow me to elaborate the essence of His Majesty's message. The King wishes to see Thais maintain a cooperative spirit and an open mind in order to jointly work towards the same highest goal of alleviating the people's suffering. These are key factors to solving Thailand's problems with greater ease. In so doing, all differences should be put aside, so that this common objective could be achieved.

His Majesty's greatest birthday wish would also be, to see Thais all over the world, live in unity and solidarity, helping one another over come difficulties together, with genuine kindness and empathy.

My fellow Thais,

I am immensely glad to see the Thai people here in Auckland become the living example of His Majesty's wishes. Your joint efforts to arrange this wonderful event is evident of how you are truly following in the footsteps of His Majesty the King, and transforming His Majesty's vision into reality.

In other parts of New Zealand as well, I have heard that Thai communities are working together in solidarity as we are doing here tonight, to help fellow compatriots in need.

I believe that the proceeds from tonight's event will be donated to the Chaipattana Foundation, a foundation established under royal patronage to help support Thai people in need. During this particular period, the Foundation will be focusing on recovery efforts for those who have suffered from this recent disastrous flood.

I am also more than happy and honoured to be able to take part in such efforts, and with these thoughts, allow me to propose a toast to His Majesty the King.

Ladies and Gentlemen, please join me in wishing His Majesty the King, good health and a long and happy life.
