## Remarks at Gala Dinner at Beehive Banquet Hall Monday 27 August 2012

## **Distinguished Members of Parliament**, **Excellencies**, **Ladies and Gentlemen:**

Tena koutou, tena koutou, tena koutou katoa;

Sawasdee krap; And good evening to everyone.

It is my great honour to be able to welcome you all here this evening. I also consider myself very privileged to have the Honourable Christopher Finlayson very kindly host our Gala Dinner here in the Beehive for the second year in a row. Thank you, Chris; and thank you also for your kind words of welcome.

Last year's event, however, was convened for a different cause. On this occasion, we wish to mark the  $50^{th}$  anniversary of the His Majesty the King's and Her Majesty the Queen's visit to New Zealand. The Beehive seemed to be the most appropriate venue to do so, since it sits on bascially

the very same spot where Their Majesties enjoyed a State Luncheon along with the then Prime Minister, the Right Honourable Keith Holyoake and Mrs Holyoake, among others. That Luncheon took place in what was in 1962 called the *Social Hall*, located pretty much right where this Beehive stands today.

I understand that Their Majesties were the first foreign royals to pay an Official Visit to New Zealand, making it an event of unique importance in New Zealand history, and also bringing the two countries that much closer together. For us Thais who have any relation with New Zealand, living here either temporarily or permanently, we fondly recall that Royal Visit as a precious memory, connecting us together as two peoples.

In order to celebrate this historic event I approached Dr Sugree Charoensook, Director of the Thailand Philharmonic Orchestra to consider bringing the orchestra to New Zealand to present one or more concerts. The TPO was founded in 2005 and has developed a distinguished reputation for the highest quality of both Thai and western classical music, including gaining several major awards. It is regularly joined by soloists, players and conductors from other countries. The current line-up of musicians includes more than 15 nationalities.

I really am very honoured that Dr Sugree and the Orchestra's Board chose to bring the orchestra to New Zealand, whilst also declining invitations to perform in other countries during the current season. May I express my very sincere appreciation for that decision. But more than that, the Orchestra has been able to obtain the sponsorship of several Thai private sector donors to pay for this trip to New Zealand: which has saved my budget a lot.

The Orchestra will be performing at the Aotea Centre in Auckland on Thursday night: with a programme to include Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2 in C Minor, as well as a selection of His Majesty The King's own musical compositions. There will also be a performance at King's College in Auckland on Wednesday morning.

Unfortunately for Wellington, despite our best efforts, we were not able to secure a suitable venue for the orchestra to perform. However, we do have here tonight four members of the orchestra who will play for you a little later on as a string quartet. And, in a special tribute to His Majesty the King: they will be playing two of His Majesty's own musical compositions: "Love" and "Candlelight Blues."

Excellencies, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It really is great to see so many members of the New Zealand Government and Opposition here with us tonight. Thank you to each of you for making the effort to join us: your presence here signals the growing closeness between our two governments and peoples. I'd also like to acknowledge the following:
