The Japan-ASEAN Integration Fund (JAIF) was officially established in March 2006, based on the pledge by then Japanese Prime Minister H. E. Mr. KOIZUMI Junichiro at the 9th ASEAN-Japan Summit held in December 2005 in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

JAIF aims at supporting integration efforts to create an ASEAN Community by facilitating the implementation of the ASEAN 2025: Forging Ahead Together, which consists of the blueprints for the ASEAN Political Security Community (APSC), ASEAN Economic Community (AEC), and ASEAN Socio-Cultural Community (ASCC), as well as the Initiative for ASEAN Integration (IAI) Work Plan IV and the Master Plan on ASEAN Connectivity (MPAC) 2025.

JAIF also aims at promoting greater cooperation between ASEAN and Japan in line with the ASEAN Outlook on the Indo-Pacific (AOIP).









Japan also assists ASEAN Member States (AMS) in other essential economic measures. Since cyberspace has a global reach beyond national borders, cooperation with countries is essential for establishing cybersecurity. In the ASEAN region, the ASEAN-Japan Cybersecurity Capacity Building Centre (AJCCBC) has been conducting cybersecurity training programmes for government agencies and critical infrastructure providers, and organising a competition for young engineers and students selected from ASEAN countries to compete in cyber attack response skills, which will help improve cybersecurity capabilities in the ASEAN region.
