RATIONALE AND OBJECTIVES

Religious Studies in the International Ph.D. Program at the College of Religious Studies (CRS) is the scholarly study of religion seeking to understand religion as a cultural phenomenon in strictly value free terms while at the same time appreciating believers' world views and value systems as vital components of their life experiences. Religious Studies seeks to examine and understand the structure and function of religion in its social and cultural contexts. A variety of academic disciplines — history, sociology, anthropology, psychology etc. — are used in the study of religion. This academically objective study of religion is rather unique at institutions in Southeast Asia.

CRS plans to become a center for the academic study and teaching of religion in Southeast Asia with a research and teaching focus on contemporary belief, practice, and development of Thai and Southeast Asian religion in regards to ethics, politics, the environment etc and of course in regards to personal spirituality. The International Ph.D. Program will aid students in understanding the dynamics of religious adaptation in response to modernization and globalization. It is hoped that education and research in the field of religious studies will help enhance the mutual understanding, cooperation, and respect among people of different religious traditions.

CRS produces graduates with appropriate professional ethics and work habits who are capable of understanding complex belief systems, practices and their socio-cultural context. Graduates are capable of reading and understanding religious and academic texts, conducting research, writing academic reports and papers, and serving as advisors on variety of cultural, political, economic etc issues in which religious belief forms an important part. CRS graduates can communicate and interact in different religious and cultural backgrounds as well as in the secular modern world.



SCHOLARSHIPS

Applicants are advised to seek their own financial support. VISA REQUIREMENT

It is the responsibility of the admitted applicants to acquire a nonimmigrant visa at the nearest Thai Embassy or Consulate to enter Thailand for study



TUITION, FEES AND OTHER EXPENSES

Estimated tuition and fees for the entire program (18 months) is Baht 172,600.- (approx. US\$ 5,760.-) which includes: University education service fee, course registration fee for the entire program, University health insurance fee for two academic years and thesis registration fee.

In addition, recommended expenses: estimated amount of US\$ 600 for student's thesis preparation, US\$ 300 for book allowance for the entire program and US\$ 600 for monthly stipend.

Thesis

Conduct original research on the selected topic in the chosen major approved by the advisory committee, submit the completed thesis and publish research in standard journals or conference proceedings.

APPLICATION AND ADMISSION

Applicants should have at least a Bachelor's degree in sciences, social sciences, humanities or education. Applicants from non-English speaking countries are required to submit a document indicating the level of their English proficiency. Normally, A TOEFL score of no less than 500, or its equivalent, is necessary in order to keep a normal pace with the class lectures and discussions, and to manage a heavy reading load. THE COLLEGE


The College of Religious Studies was established in 1999, located at the Namthong Building, Salaya Campus of Mahidol University.




THE PROGRAM

The International Master of Arts Program aims to provide students with the opportunity to concentrate their studies and research on one of three tracks: Religious Studies, Buddhism and Society, and Buddhism & Islam focusing on the academic study of religion, religious belief and practice in contemporary society, and current moral issues. The program is designed to promote an academic approach to religion in multi-cultural settings.

The curriculum extends over 18-months. The twelve months are devoted to course work in order to build a strong foundation for conducting independent research, students begin the work on their Master's theses during the rest of 6 months and the degree candidates will have to submit theses to fulfill the requirements of the program.

The program requirements include successful completion of the course work and a thesis, under the close supervision of the College's academic staff. The program requires at least 24 credits for course work (8, 3 credit courses) and 12 credits for thesis. A minimum grade point average of 3.00 is required.



Program Curriculum

The program consists of Plan 1 and Plan 2: Applicants must select either Plan 1 or 2.

Plan 1: Research Only: Students are required to successfully pass the qualifying examination and complete dissertation research

Plan 2: Coursework and Research: Students are required to take prerequisite courses in Religious Studies, their coursework, qualifying examination and individual dissertation research


