A Long Journey

I was born on February 22, 1935, in a humble clay house with a thatched roof in the village of Kuruwita, a beautiful village near Ratnapura. Just three days later, my uncle took me to the only two-story house in our village, accompanied by a calf and a dairy heifer named *Ratthi*, as I was to be nourished with cow's milk in the absence of my mother's.

Tragedy struck early when my father passed away. I was raised by my adoptive mother's family, whose generosity in providing milk earned their home the name 'Milk House.' School was a struggle—I often arrived late, skipped classes, and napped on reed beds. My truancy led to a Rs. 5/- fine for my adoptive mother, a moment that changed me forever. From then on, I worked hard and excelled in school. From a young age, I found solace in art, drawing flowers, birds, and temple murals with a stone stick. My schoolteacher often displayed my work with pride. By the 7th grade, I was illustrating death notices in exchange for white cloth and colored pencils. Soon, villagers entrusted me with portraits of their deceased loved ones—a poignant but meaningful task.

Vesak ignited my creativity further; instead of lanterns, I designed airplanes and ships. By nine, I had mastered human figures, and my teacher used my sketchbook as a teaching tool. Many of my early drawings still decorate homes in my village today.

In 1952, I completed my Ordinary Level exam and pursued further studies at Kuruwita Maha Vidyalaya. My artistic reputation grew as I painted portraits for funeral pandals. Encouraged by relatives, I joined Heywood Art Institute in 1957, overcoming financial hardship with my brother's support. At Heywood, I thrived, impressing instructors like Mr. David Painter with my watercolor work. In 1960, I took up a night laborer position at the Wellawatte Textile Mill, earning Rs. 80 per month. I received a Rs. 50 scholarship and invested all of it in my art education. My talent caught the attention of Mrs. Stanley Abhayasinghe, an official at the textile factory, who transformed my career by introducing me to textile design. My artistic reputation grew, particularly after I painted a portrait of a foreigner's wife, which garnered widespread appreciation. I gained a lot of knowledge about painting and materials, many of which I still use today.

On January 4, 1967, I became a government art teacher, first in a schoof of Embilipitiya, later in Kuruwita Central Collage . For 28 years, I nurtured generations of students, guiding them in Vesak and Poson decorations, sports festivals, and competitions where their talents shone nationally and internationally. After a few years of retirement, I resumed teaching children while gradually returning to painting. During this time, I began to annotate my memories in different forms—whether as poetry, essays, or sketches on paper. I focused on capturing the changes in my surrounding village, documenting its transformation over time. These sketches were later transferred onto fabric, much like I did in my younger years.

My work reflects the essence of my life experiences: the beauty of Sri Pada, the Delgamuwa temple, the Kuruganga River, the lush paddy fields, and the vibrant life of the village. I drew inspiration from the people's daily activities, including gem miners, farmers, and the animals that accompanied them. These memories have become an integral part of my art. Even now, I find inspiration in the presentwhether from captivating images in the newspaper or television, they spark new ideas. I have always been drawn to beautiful colors, and now I no longer aim for strict realism. Instead, I approach my art more artistically. I dream, sketch, and paint quickly, driven by the eagerness to express my thoughts. My brush and imagination flow freely, unrestrained by any boundaries.

It was not an easy journey, as I had not painted extensively for many years. However, the process brought immense joy and fulfillment. Over the last two decades, my art has evolved into new styles, reflecting my experiences and emotions. For me, painting is a way to express my feelings and capture even the simplest moments of life.

I am spending my life contentedly, surrounded by my beautiful wife, lifelong partner Padmini, and my children and grandchildren, still working with a deep sense of purpose. I have transformed my home into a unique gallery, "Abayawardana Kalagaraya," and created a library filled with books for art enthusiasts and children. I participate in school events as the oldest alumnus and the teacher. I humbly accept the recognition I have received, including awards like "Kalabushana" and many other accolades from local institutions. Additionally, I initiated a small temple near the village's grand Bo tree, with stunning Sri Pada view and the river gently flowing around it, creating a serene space that embodies the harmony of nature.

It brings me great joy to know that others find meaning and delight in my artwork. To me, this is a life worth cherishing—an unending journey of artistic discovery, where beauty is shared and experienced by all, just as my name "Abayawardana" reflects the essence of offering protection and kindness.
